Royal Derby Hospital

Many of you know I have been a Chaplaincy Visitor at the Royal Derby Hospital for over ten years where I visit wards, praying with patients and their families, staff and arranging communion for them.

In addition, I have recently been chosen and trained to become a Eucharistic Minister on a Sunday, taking and giving communion to patients and staff on the wards, so still being part of the hospital's chaplaincy team. These two roles extend and complement the role of the chaplains in offering companionship and support to patients, their visitors and staff.

We offer our time, patience and presence in the service of God and have been called upon to accompany others as they face injury and illness. Above all, our concern is to care for those in need with compassion and humility, respecting and upholding the dignity of all the people we meet, being ever mindful of the trust and privilege of our position.

The Sunday service in the Faith Centre at the hospital no longer takes place, as patients who were well enough to attend are sent home to recover, thus leaving more poorly people in over the weekend. So now more patients are requesting communion and prayers on a Sunday.

Rev Lew Greaves, who was with us here at Ashbourne for a short while, now joins us in Chaplaincy as a Chaplain and will be working across the children's wards, starting on the 3rd July.

Attacks against Christians in India have been rising at an alarming rate,

according to new reports. They are politically motivated, and have increased since the March 2017 elections, which saw a landslide victory for Hindu nationalists.

The latest report of the All India Christian Council records an increase of almost 20 per cent in attacks against Christians in 2016. It says physical violence against Christians is up 40 per cent and murders have doubled.

In states across India, church workers have been beaten, threatened and killed.

Attempts have been made to force Christians to renounce their faith and convert to Hinduism. Church services and prayer meetings have been disrupted, churches and Christian school have been bombed, torched, vandalised and demolished. Bibles have been torn to pieces and burnt. Militants beat one evangelist with chains, stripped him and forced him to drink urine. A Christian cemetery was desecrated and skeletons dug up and strewn across the graveyard.

The report, *Atrocities on Christians in India* records a fresh attack every 40 hours. It says: 'The attacks have become severe and more frequent. Incidents used to be confined to a few states. Now the violence has spread to 23 states.' The sharpest rise has been recorded in Uttar Pradesh and the state of Telangana.

Right-wing Hindu nationalism has been gaining ground since the BJP took power in 2014. Since further gains for the radicals in the March elections, five Indian states have now imposed anti-conversion laws. There have also been moves to bring in nationwide legislation aimed at outlawing evangelism, to prevent Hindus from converting. *Release International* reports that in Andhra Pradesh a pastor was beaten to death by a Maoist. In Assam, a couple who had recently converted to Christianity were murdered in their home. A pastor and his seven-month pregnant wife were doused with petrol by religious extremists, who threatened them with swords and demanded they chant, 'Hail Lord Rama'.

Derbyshire Churches Together groups have links with the Church of North India and in Ashbourne we are in partnership with the Patna Diocese and recently had a visit from Bishop Phillip and Rev Francis Hansdah. **Please remember all Indian Christians in your prayers.**

REFLECTIONS.

As a small note of introduction to this "Reflections" article, I need to point out that a similar copy goes to the Mayfield Parish Magazine, and I correspond with the editor, Joyce, not only for the magazine, but, as said in the article, to inform her of the bird life around Harlow Farm, so read on!

I do like reading the Parish Magazine, and in regard to this article I have been inspired by Joyce Beeson's articles on the bird life in her garden, and by the fact I also keep her informed of what I have seen around our farm.

I might add that on my rounds of the farm to check on our animals or whenever our son, Adam, and I are outside working in the fields on gates or fences, I always carry a small pair of binoculars that Mary, my sister in law, bought me some time ago, which I have found invaluable to look at birds, and, due to my past days in the aircraft field, if i see an aircraft in an unusual flight path to look at that also.

Sometime ago, when working outside, Adam and I heard the call of a Skylark, we looked all around us, and up into the sky, but did not see the little bird, but, listening to its call reminded us of years ago, when we went to the air displays at RAF Mildenhall in Suffolk.

During the 6 hour show, we saw some of the most powerful, (and noisy) aircraft from the air arms of the RAF, USAF and NATO. From single engine fighters, to immense bombers were performing. Sometimes even the ground shook as say, the Vulcan bomber powered into the sky as it went into a steep climb, and setting off innumerable car alarms in the process!

But what caught our attention, was in the midst of this cacophony, you could see Skylarks hovering on the wing and hear their singing, sometimes, even above the noise of the jets.

In remembering this and the recent call of the Skylark over our fields I thought of the prophet Elijah, on the run from Jezebel, in 1 Kings Ch. 19., and in the desert he was told the Lord was about to pass by. The story says there was a mighty wind, then an earthquake, followed by a fire, but, it says the Lord was not in them. After the fire came a gentle whisper and it says Elijah went out, stood at the mouth of the cave to hear the voice of God!

When today, hearing the noise of aircraft, while walking the fields and hearing not just the Skylark, but all our wild birds call, I am reminded of that tale in the life of Elijah, and, as the hymns says, "*That still small voice of calm*" that is the voice of God, still speaking to us in the cacophony of the world, if we can be still for a moment and take time to listen!

Message from the President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference following fire at Grenfell Tower.

The horror of the burning tower in Notting Hill will be imprinted on many people's minds for a long time. Our shared grief has, however, only intensified as we heard the stories: of the people who are lost, people who have lost everything, and people still searching for the lost. Few of us will have been able to witness these events unfold without weeping. And now comes the anger, at those with power, at past decisions, at powerlessness.

The Methodist Church in Notting Hill has been at the forefront over the last few days. It is the first public building outside the police cordon, and has been a focus for grief and practical help. The people there and its leaders will need our prayers and support long into the future.

At times of such heartbreaking events we risk being overwhelmed. How can we respond?

Our first response, along with the prophet Ezekiel who was among a people from whom everything had been taken, has to be one of being alongside people and holding silence (Ezekiel 3.15). To sit with people. To listen to them. To lament for and with them. To offer care and to remain silent as we feel the loss, the pain, the fear, the anger. For there is certainly anger, and it is not to be dismissed or condemned. There is much to be angry about. People will feel angry at God. Angry at those who had the power to act, but didn't. At a society which values less those who are the poorest or most disadvantaged in society. We are often afraid of anger. We have an image of Jesus as "meek and mild". But we also see Jesus in the temple, who was angry to the point of overturning tables. Yet this was not an act of violence but a symbolic expression of anger in the prophetic tradition, disrupting the actions of those who would discriminate against and exploit the poorest at the door of God's house. We should be angry at the kind of injustices emerging from this catastrophe: the apparent under investing in the well-being of poorest and the ignoring of their concerns. And we should all repent where we have been complicit with injustice in the past.

But the anger of Jesus is focused not on retaliation but on the righting of injustice. Matthew tells how, after overthrowing the tables, the blind and the lame came to Jesus, the very people who had been excluded from the temple by those with power. They came to Jesus and they were healed. Jesus' anger led to justice. It showed that a different way was not only possible, but was required of the people who followed Jesus.

Our time as President and Vice-President has been one of change: we have had the resignation of a prime minister, the signing of Article 50, a new US President and a General Election. We have had horrific terrorist attacks in Manchester and London, as well as in so many countries around the world. And now we are rocked by Grenfell Tower. It is increasingly clear that we are a divided country, and a much more divided world.

Is this a turning point? Is God asking of us a new and radical response? The love of God, and the command to care for our neighbour, does not finish at the end of our street, or even at our national borders. And if that is the case, then we have to consider - and prioritise - the needs and voices of the poorest and the most disadvantaged, not only in this country, but in around the world.

So what do we do? We face the reality that we cannot change everything tomorrow. But we must hold in front of us this alternative way, the picture of the kingdom of God. And then we have to proclaim it and live it out, in our own lives and in our communities. But it must not stop there. It needs to spill out into a passion for transforming the political and economic world, working with all who share a vision for justice and the common good. We remember that judgement in Matthew 25 is reserved for those who have not lived out the ways of the kingdom.

During this year as President and Vice-President we have taken the text from Micah: "What does the Lord require of you, but to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God". Now is a time to cling to those words, realise that they demand of us repentance for our past actions and present privileges, and to commit ourselves to love without measure, act for justice whatever the cost, and do so whilst walking humbly with a God of love and justice.

From the "Loose Canon" -

The Rev Giles Fraser is a columnist for the *Guardian Newspaper* and the following extract is from an article he wrote following the terrorist attack on Westminster Bridge, having just opened his church for prayer. Maybe you will find it helpful as I did.

"Prayer is not a way of telling God the things he already knows. Nor is it an act of collective lobbying, whereby the Almighty is encouraged to see the world from your perspective if you screw up your face really hard and wish it so. Forget Christopher Robin at the end of the bed. Prayer is mostly about emptying your head waiting for stuff to become clear. There is no secret formula. And holding people in your prayers is not wishful thinking. It's a sort of compassionate concentration, where someone is deliberately thought about in the presence of the widest imaginable perspective - like giving them a mental cradling. But above all, prayer is often just a jolly good excuse to shut up for a while and think".

Not much of a doubter, really

It's a strange nickname for a man whose burning faith in Jesus took him, so some accounts say, all the way to India to found a Christian Church there (Mar Thoma). But 'Doubting Thomas' he is, and in one way it's good to have someone in the early band of disciples who represents all those of us who tend to find unquestioning faith difficult.

His tendency to ask the searching, even perhaps sarcastic question, can be found in the Gospel (see John 14:6), but his reputation was set for ever on the first Easter night. Thomas was not in the Upper Room when the risen Jesus appeared for the first time to the apostles, and when they told him what had happened he was unimpressed. "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my fingers in his wounds I will not believe."

A week later Jesus appeared again, and this time not only was Thomas there, but Jesus singled him out for special attention. "Come on," he said, "here are the wounds. Do not doubt, but believe." That was the end of the Doubter, who fell to his knees to exclaim, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus observed that he had seen and believed. There would be many in the future, He said, who would not have such evidence set before them, but yet would believe. Among them, I like to think, are many Thomases, people for whom faith (in the sense of believing propositions) is seldom easy. I suspect Thomas's favourite saying of Jesus was "Seek and you will find." It's not a bad one to have in mind this year on St Thomas's Day, 3rd July. *Canon David Winter*

LOCAL METHODIST HISTORY - part 2

In the April edition of "CONNECTIONS" with the help of Don Cox our organist at AMC, we told the rather sad story of an abortive proposal in 1965 to establish a new Free Church in Ashbourne by the merging of Beulah (Primitive) Methodist Church with the Trinity Methodists, our present AMC, to form a new Central Free Church.

May 1988 marked the 250th anniversary of John Wesley's conversion and the event was marked in Ashbourne by a re-enactment of John Wesley's visit to Ashbourne in 1772. I am again grateful to Don Cox for sharing with me a press cutting and photographs of the event which took place in the Market Place. The then Superintendent Minister, Rev Peter Evan dressed as John Wesley, arrived in the Market Place by a horse drawn carriage accompanied by Derek Gillespie of Brailsford as John's brother Charles. Many of the gathered ecumenical crowd were also dressed in period costume.

Mr Evan took as the text for his sermon from Isaiah "Seek ye the Lord while he may be found", the same text that Wesley had preached on his visit to the town. As well as members of the then eleven circuit chapels the event was attended by Christians from other churches in the town and by the Mayor Councillor Fred Elliot and his wife. John Wesley had however paid a much earlier visit to Ashbourne. The Methodist Society (ie. the present Ashbourne Church) was formed on Tuesday, 8th April, 1755 when John Wesley visited Ashbourne for the first time. He was on his way from Barton-under-Needwood to Hayfield, and arrived in Ashbourne at 7. 00am. He tells us in his Journal, 'I preached to a deeply serious congregation. Seventeen or eighteen then desired to join in a society to whom I spoke severally. I was well pleased to find that near half of them knew the pardoning love of God. One of the first I spoke to was Miss Judith Beresford -a sweet but short-lived flower.'

Judith Beresford writes subsequently to one of Mr Wesley's preachers, John Johnson, about her struggles with her faith. She died at the age of 24 years. You can read more about this in Trevor Stainiforth's account of early Methodism in Ashbourne on our website -
