


#### Merle was a most gracious and

As you read this we shall be in the season of Advent, and the theme of our Advent displays at Ashbourne this year is *Stars of Christmas*. 20 years of Shoe Boxes – a personal reflection

In 1997 Michael and I moved to Ashbourne to start a B & B and, later, a conference centre. We brought with us the, then, new idea of packing a shoe box with small gifts for children in countries experiencing trauma due to war, famine, and/or disease. It had just been taken on by Samaritan's Purse from the original founders, who had seen for themselves the terrible plight of abandoned children in orphanages in Romania.

Coming to a new church, we wondered if anyone would like to join us in making up a box, so I advertised in the magazine. That first year we had 3 boxes, and were helped by Marianne and Eric Mathews. The next year we had more boxes, and I also mooted the idea of knitting teddy bears to go into the boxes. Soon this became something of a cottage industry. Marianne made a 'bed' to display the teddies. In addition the people in church have knitted hundreds of scarves, hats and mittens.

The number of boxes grew rapidly, with more and more people wanting to join in the fun. They were taken to Yeoman's store, and then on to the main warehouse in Chesterfield. The first Derby warehouse I went to help at was on the first floor of an empty building in Full Street. The boxes were slid down to the ground floor on fire station rescue boards to save carrying them down the stairs. The next building I helped at was in the area now occupied by Intu, which was just being developed as Westfield. There was no heating or lighting, and no toilets. (but fortunately there was the shopping centre nearby with public facilities!), it was just an empty shell. It was very basic, but fun. As it was a very cold winter we all wore arctic clothing. The building was serviced by a generator, chained outside to the nearest lamp. It mostly worked, but after dark (we often worked till late) it was often a case of did we have lighting or heating if we were running out of fuel! Fortunately, there was a light on the car park, just outside the window, so we usually chose heat. The premises used these days are a definite improvement, but maybe not so much fun.


In the 20 years that Ashbourne Circuit has been taking part in the project we have collected hundreds, if not thousands, of boxes, and have raised a lot of money to help with the enormous cost of shipping the boxes. It is impossible to assess the impact these simple gifts has on the children receiving them. It is probably matched by the pleasure of those who pack a box. It is great fun. Until this year we also checked and sealed the boxes locally in Century Hall before they were sent to the warehouse, but this year, due to new and stringent regulations, this is being done centrally, which is sad, because that, too, was a very enjoyable part of the whole project which brought together many people to help and get to know each other better. We never ran short of helpers.

From such a very small beginning, our local participation has expanded enormously, with many other churches, clubs, schools, and organisations taking part. The Ashbourne contribution to the overall total in the Derby area is 10%, a splendid achievement. **Thank you to everyone who has taken part over the years,** in so many ways. The sight of all the colourful boxes at the annual blessing service is a treat. I am delighted that a new group has now taken over the running of the project in Ashbourne, and trust that it will continue for many years. ### *Two tributes to Sister Merle Wilde*

"MERLE." I feel that I have been privileged to know two "Saints" in my lifetime, (although I know the two I name would deny vehemently that they were "Saints") One was Mrs Lowe, wife of George, and mother of John and Maurice Lowe, from Beresford Dale. The other was Merle Wilde.

Merle was a wonderful person, I started to know about her when I came to this area in the mid 1970's when I was courting Ann. After Ann and I married, and we set up home here, and later in my life I got to know Merle a whole lot more.

I learned that she was related to Jessica, Ann's mother, and often spent time at Harlow Farm. Merle would always call in for tea, if she had been preaching at Stanton, sometimes she would come for lunch if she had been preaching at Mayfield.

What comes to mind was whenever she came in the farm house, upon greeting Geoffrey and Jessica, she would always say "Can I do anything for you Jessica"?

In recollecting her life in these days that followed her death I thought that those words, "*Can I do anything for you*"?, were representative of Merle's way in more ways than just helping a lifelong friend prepare for a meal.

Her work in Kenya, Bristol and Notting Hill, that we read in her autobiography of her missionary days, were of Merle, doing things, for her Lord, and for His people, wherever they were, abroad, or in this country or around her home.

In this area, not many a day went past that I did not see her off in her car, to help a friend, to do the assembly at a school, to take a service, preach the gospel, lead a bible study, and be somewhere for someone that she knew needed her to be there. For nothing was too much for Merle to do, for her Lord, in the work she had been given and that also

included making time for a visit to her own family, who were very much in her heart, and helped on the farm and help them personally whenever she could.

While writing this article, I thought that's maybe why Merle had, at 96, such a long and fruitful life, that she prayed earnestly to her Lord, to be given the time to fulfil all she could for Her Lord Jesus! I was saddened when she took ill and cried when I saw what the stroke had done to her, yet she grasped my hand and smiled as best she could that smile that was always part of her, as she held my hand in hers and pressed it to her cheek as I said " Shall we pray together?". Merle managed to say "Yes" and we did. Later, alone, I prayed, as I knew many did, that she would be released from her pain, and wondered why Merle held on so long!

But then I realised, and mentioned to folk that asked, the same thought that I had. It was that great heart and spirit, that the Lord had given her which took her from, Kniveton to Kenya and back again and all points in between, plus the work of the Lord she did in our own area, would just not let go!

It was if Merle still thought that the Lord Jesus still had something that he wanted her to do and she would wait awhile for His call! As a line in her book says, quoting J.H Newman, *"I loved to chose and see my path, but now Thou, lead me on"!* Yes, Merle was still waiting to be led! Well, He, the Lord, has led her on now, to the Crown that surely awaits her. I will miss her, deeply, but, I give thanks for Merle's life and the joy to have known her and call her my friend!

#### **From Elizabeth Spencer**

I have known Merle for many, many years, which developed into a very close friendship. Merle visited myself and my late mother at home and when my mother was in hospital fighting cancer, Merle was there alongside praying and comforting and so it was only right that Merle took part in my mother's funeral service.

Many years later when I became part of the Chaplaincy team at the Royal Derby Hospital, it was Merle who gave me a reference. She told me how important it was to love and care for people in hospital and for the lonely and I would be the perfect person for this. Merle would phone me or leave me a message saying someone she knew or someone from church was in hospital and would I visit and pray for them. Then there were times when I drove Merle to hospital as she never liked driving round the big island outside. Taking me to visit people with her, our friendship developed and I saw from Merle's eyes and her ways the love and care she had for people.

Every time at hospital, be it visiting or Merle having treatment we would finish off by going into the chapel in the Faith Centre and praying together, then go into the office for tea and biscuits and a chat with the Chaplains and others. They all knew Merle and loved her. I remember a time not so long ago when Merle asked me to go with her for an appointment; During the discussion with a doctor he said to Merle 'you are retired' to which Merle answered 'no'. So he thinking she had not heard him correctly repeated it. Again Merle said 'no' and went on to tell him she still preached, drove, cooked for herself and then about her life in Kenya. It went very quiet as he could not believe what he was hearing.

Every time I visited Merle at her home I found her welcoming and she gave me an insight into her life and her family. Many times we would have tea and a slice of malt loaf together and catch up on recent events. During these visits we never parted without prayer for family, friends and events with Merle always finishing with a prayer for me and for my work at the hospital.

While Merle was in hospital I visited two or three times a week and always arranged bedside holy communion for her on a Sunday, many times taking this to her as Eucharistic Minister.

Towards the end of Merle's life at home I visited every day and at her bedside I held her hand, prayed for her, read the Bible to her and talked of old times. I was there for Merle and her family just as Merle had been there for me. It has been an honour and a privilege to have known Merle and to have had her in my life. I miss Merle – a great lady and my dear friend. Till we meet again, God bless.

# Report on a visit to Patna Diocese, North India on behalf of Ashbourne's Patna Partnership in September 2017

Thanks to Anna & Martyn Davis of Hulland for their report: Our 3-week visit was based at the Patna Diocesan Headquarters in Bhagalpur from where we made visits to Taljhari, Barharwa and Hiranpur. Throughout our visit we were accompanied by our teenage granddaughter Emily who had been wanting to visit India for many years having spent time with Bishop and Lily Marandih's daughter Preety when she visited England in 2008.

#### **Bhagalpur Church:**

A noticeable feature of India in September was the heat and humidity level which took some accommodating. However, the reason for the visit being in September was at the invitation of Bishop Philip Marandih to attend a Diocesan Celebration on 15<sup>th</sup> September for his 21 years consecration as Bishop, and then the wedding of his second son Praveen on 18<sup>th</sup> September. Unfortunately the wedding had to be postponed until November due to the bride's mother's illness and an operation, so we were unable to attend that celebration.

During the Celebration Service the Bishop expressed in English his thanks and appreciation of the support of the Ashbourne Patna Partnership, and it was good that we could be there as representatives. Afterwards we greeted many pastors from the diocese, recognising in particular Francis, Manoj, Daniel and Rev Toppo. Sadly we saw no more of Manoj during the remainder of our visit but we did see more of Francis who invited us for a meal when we were able to meet his wife and son. It also gave Francis an opportunity to explain to us the work that he is doing supporting very small Christian communities in villages in the northern part of the diocese, a very orthodox Hindu region. It appears to be challenging work.

#### **Bhagalpur Schools:**

We were able to make several visits to Christ Church Diocesan School, where the Bishop's daughter Preety is now the Principal, and spend some time in each of the classes. The presence of Emily was the cause of much curiosity and interest particularly with the older students. Our activities in the school included teaching a new song for assembly, visiting each class for a question and answer session, and being invited as guests to football and kabbadi contests and to present awards. As it was the start of the Hindu Festival of Durga Puja a rangooli competition was set up with each class making their own picture design on the floor outside their classroom. As honoured guests we were asked to judge and present awards. The standard of artwork and design was most impressive.

#### Taljhari and Barharwa:

In Taljhari we were taken to St John's School but most of the students were away because of the Hindu festival so we could not see the school functioning. Bishop Philip informed us there are now over 300 students. Whilst in Taljhari Emily had a taste of traditional Santali culture by being dressed in the local costume and participating in tribal dancing with friends and family. The Bishop joined in with his mouth organ.

#### Hiranpur, St Luke's Hospital:

We managed to negotiate a visit to stay with Doctors Elisabeth and Shubhro at St Luke's Hospital and were pleased to see that the hospital now has a solar powered generator which was formally inaugurated and blessed by Bishop Marandih in June 2016. Efforts to provide a reliable water supply have some complications needing to be addressed. A laboratory is being set up for routine medical tests to be carried out on site and a refurbished house was nearing completion for a doctor to take up residence imminently. The establishment of a reliable power and water supply is an essential pre-requisite for getting the hospital officially registered.

Some of you will have met Rev. Abhir Adhikari, from Calcutta, who visited Ashbourne in November. We have also had recent visits from Bishop Philip, Rev Francis, Rev Manoj and Rev Daniel.

#### **Return to India**

We have asked the Mallards to give us some details of their visit. They thank you for all your interest and support.

#### Ruth writes;

"Joy, Ruth (2nd visit for us two) and Christian (1st visit and he will celebrate his 15th birthday here) - visit to India - depart from Birmingham for Delhi on the evening of 14th Dec (straight after school). Arrive in Delhi 15th (16-19th - independent travel by train -Agra, Varanasi, Kolkata) Arrive Kolkata early morning 20th Dec. We are there to work voluntarily at the Bishop's invitation. We are staying in the city and providing a daily children's programme for the orphan children and young people at the Arunima Hospice (where Joy and I went in Oct 2015). We also hope to visit some CRS (Cathedral Relief Service) projects and to meet up with other folk who we met on our 2015 visit - mainly with connections to the Cathedral and CRS. Joy has stayed in touch with young people from the Cathedral and School community (where we stayed last time) via social media. We return home on 31st Dec. Please pray for health, stamina, good relationships, security for us and our belongings, good travel and smooth arrangements as far as possible! "

#### PHAKAMISA PROJECT

It is very encouraging to tell you that since 2009 to date  $\pm 2572.00$  of Phakamisa beadwork has been sold – much of this at Ashbourne Methodist Church but also at other places, events and to individuals.

We still have some stock but will not be doing regular beadwork stalls now. If you would like any for your own use or at an event we are very happy to provide the items.

The Pinetown Methodist project in South Africa continues to help and support many needy children and adults and the beadwork sales have provided valuable income to some of the most marginalised and poor people who also care for many other vulnerable individuals. Anne Wills will be able to tell us more very soon after her visit to the project.

### Let Jesus Show!

The nativity scene with all its characters was in place, as the children (representing angels), gathered around the manger. They sang: 'Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace, good will among men'. Suddenly a small girl on the edge of the crowd, who couldn't see what was going on, shouted out, 'Let Jesus show!'

At Christmas time, we want to let Jesus show, in our churches, communities and lives. We have an amazing message to share: 'in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; He is the Messiah, the Lord' (Luke 2:10). It was to the shepherds, apart from his parents, that Jesus was first showed.

The filthy, hardworking shepherds, living in the fields with their flock of dirty animals, were unlikely candidates for this honour. By the nature of their work, they had the status of migrant workers. Yet this underlines for us that the good news of Christmas is for everyone, irrespective of social standing, background, race or gender.

No doubt these simple shepherds would have had no idea of what the names given to Jesus fully meant (ie Saviour, Messiah and Lord). All they needed to know, and all we need to know, is that God has done something unique in coming to earth as a human being. This is good news of great joy for everybody!

After worshipping the child, the shepherds returned to their normal routine. However, they would never be the same again! Even though their work and social standing were unchanged, they had a message to share and let Jesus show. Although we don't normally see angels, we have the same good news to share! When Christmas is over and we're back to our normal routines, how will we let Jesus show in our lives?

# Rohingya Refugee Crisis Appeal

Methodist relief and development "*All We Can*", the Methodist Church in Britain's relief and development agency ,is calling for support for this urgent appeal for refugees displaced by the recent violence in Myanmar.

Over the past few months, more than half a million people have fled violence in Myanmar's Rakhine State. The majority of those fleeing are Rohingya women and children.

*"All We Can"* is calling for generous support for this urgent appeal to assist those seeking refuge in Bangladesh. People are in desperate need of water, food, shelter and access to medical care.

Since violence flared up in Myanmar in late August, an estimated 519,000 Rohingya have sought shelter and safety in Bangladesh. Many are currently living in temporary, unsanitary structures constructed out of plastic sheeting and bamboo in informal camps and settlements.

Refugees are arriving in Bangladesh exhausted and traumatized, and camps and local host communities are struggling to respond to the scale of this disaster.

Food insecurity is one of the primary areas of concern, while providing health care, access to safe water and mitigating the threat of disease is critical. Heavy rains in recent days have made an already precarious situation worse for refugees trying to seek shelter in sub-standard housing and makeshift camps. *All We Can's* partner is responding to this emergency and is calling for urgent funds to help reach people suffering because of this crisis.

Many bring with them accounts of brutality and report having seen and suffered atrocities that have left them traumatised. Meeting the needs of these refugees who have suffered so much is critical.

### Would you like to write a prayer for the next Methodist Prayer Handbook?

The theme for next year's Methodist Prayer Handbook will be 'a world transformed by God's love', inspired by the One Mission Statement of the Methodist Church in Britain.

The theme runs like this: through Christ, in the power of the Spirit, we share God's mission, both to renew the created order and to transform lives, communities and nations. Christians and their neighbours are not only subjects of change but agents of change. Individually and collectively we are both challenged and changed by God's transforming love. Each Lent many of us have Lent readings for daily devotions. In 2018 we're hoping to have our own booklet of readings with reflections from members of chapels in the Circuit.


