No love that in a family dwells, no carolling in frosty air, Nor all the steeple-shaking bells can with this single Truth compare -That God was man in Palestine, and lives today in Bread and Wine.

Brailsford Coffee Shop

The Coffee Shop, which is held at the Methodist Church on Tuesday mornings between 9.30–11.30am, first opened in November 2009. It is run jointly by All Saints' Church and the Methodist Church, with volunteers from both Churches and the community helping each week.

As well as providing a friendly place for people to meet, we also raise money for different charities, choosing a different charity each year. Over $\pounds7,000$ has been donated in the last ten years to about sixteen different charities including YMCA, Brailsford School, ACE Youth Trust, MacMillan Cancer Care and both Churches.

Brailsford Pre-School regularly have bake sales which are especially enjoyed by Alfreton Cycling group who usually call in once a month. We also invite the children from Brailsford School at Easter, Harvest and Christmas to entertain us with singing and playing instruments.

The coffee shop celebrated its 10th birthday at the beginning of November. On Monday 4th November we invited all the helpers, past and present, to a buffet lunch. Helen Naylor from Uppercrust made us a lovely buffet. It was good to be able to thank everyone who has volunteered at the coffee shop.

On Tuesday 5th November, at the weekly coffee shop, we gave everyone free tea, coffee and cakes and also had a celebration cake. We also welcomed Pat Laughlin from Ashbourne Community Transport. ACT are our chosen charity for this year and we gave them £500. Groups have also raised money including Patna book swaps and Traidcraft stalls.

Margaret Marie Cox

Margaret was born at home in Station Street, Ashbourne in 1935. She went to the Church of England girls' school on Mayfield Road where she passed her 'entrance exam' (the old 11 Plus) for the Queen Elizabeth's Grammar School.



After completing her schooling, she was told by her mother that she could not go to college or University, but needed to get a job and start earning some money to help the family income. She did as she was told and started work in the office of the Midland Drapery in Derby.

Margaret and Don were married on the 16th July 1955. Margaret was still living with her mum and dad until Don completed his national service when they moved into their first house, a council house on the Park Road estate in Ashbourne.

Margaret worked at William Tatton's in Mayfield, but when her two sons were born, she had to change her working arrangements . Later she worked full-time, becoming the Health and Safety training officer for the factory. Within a short time, she was appointed as the Head of the Personnel department for the factory and two more factories in Yorkshire. This promotion meant Margaret was required to visit the Yorkshire factories, leaving home at 6.00am in the morning and not getting back home until 7.00pm.

Together, Don and Margaret travelled all over the world on holidays. Margaret was always the one who wanted to take up the challenges when on holiday. She climbed up a rock face in Borneo before abseiling back to earth, with Don watching on from the safety of the ground below. She snorkelled on the Great Barrier Reef, climbed into the tunnels in Vietnam and scrambled into the pyramids in Egypt.

One event Don remembers very clearly involved a safari trip in Kenya when their vehicle developed a puncture. The driver informed the group they had to get out of the vehicle so he could change the wheel. This was fine apart from the fact that there was pride of lions, with cubs, only 25 yards away. The driver said they should be ok IF they kept quiet. As you can imagine, the first person out, following the driver, was Margaret taking photographs. Margaret also spent many hours working within the Church, organising flower festivals, harvest festivals, Christmas and Summer Fairs. She was heavily involved with the development of Gateway, twice helped paint the Century Hall, and taught in the Sunday School along with Eric Matthews. Before teaching at this Church, Margaret also taught at the Beulah Primitive Methodist Chapel in Station Street, where she was the Sunday School Supervisor before it was closed in 1965.

Margaret led a very active and meaningful life, filled with wonderful experiences and always ready to meet a challenge. She faced adversity head on, as can be demonstrated as she fought with her illnesses, keeping her myeloma at bay for more than seven years. Her consultant for that period claimed her as 'his best pupil' who had exceeded all of his expectations in fighting against her myeloma. Margaret died on Sunday 20th October. 'FOOTPRINTS' - Memories and thoughts of Margaret Cox

In 1968 my father passed away, having had a brain haemorrhage and being in a coma for six months, at the age of 59 years old. I was 33 years old at that time with two small boys. Most of my life I'd had a strong Christian faith, after attending a Billy Graham meeting at Wembley. During my father's illness, I found it impossible to walk into the church because I blamed God for not helping me.

At my lowest point, I even contemplated suicide, and it was at this time I heard a knock on the window and there stood a Jehovah's Witness. With tears streaming down my face, his word to me was, "Now where is your God?" I was on the verge of a complete breakdown and he nearly completed the job. I just couldn't enter the Church, and felt I had lost my friend and support.

I had been sitting there alone for a while when Minnie Smith (Jan's mum) walked in the door, put her arms around me and prayed. She had brought me a plaque and to me it was a lifeline. The words on the plaque read: "Lord you promised me that, once I followed you, you would always be with me all the way, but I have noticed only one set of footprints in the sand. Why, when I need you, and my church family, am I alone?"

My God replied, "My precious, precious child, I love you and will never leave you during your time of trouble and suffering. When you saw only one set of prints, I was carrying you."

Over the last few months, I have been desperate and needed your thoughts and prayers, so I thank the ones that have carried me with their love and prayers. *(Written by Margaret)*

"God in Love Unites Us"

Over the past few months, there have been a number of references in *Connections* to the ongoing discussions, within the Methodist Church, regarding marriage and relationships. The most recent was in John Barker's report of the District Synod which appeared in the November magazine.

A major report on this subject was discussed at the Methodist Conference in July 2019. A new set of principles outlining the qualities of good relationships was commended for prayerful discussion and response across the Church over the next year.

The report makes a number of proposals, including:

- principles or qualities of good relating
- an understanding of cohabitation
- to allow same-sex couples to marry in Methodist churches
- providing resources and liturgies to celebrate civil partnerships
- prayers for when marriages end in divorce

The Ashbourne Circuit is arranging two meetings in February 2020 to consider and discuss these proposals.

The meetings will be held as follows:

Saturday 1st February, 10.00am - 12.30pm at Ashbourne

Wednesday 12th February, 7.00pm - 9.30pm at Brailsford

The two meetings will be organised on the same lines and cover the same ground. The idea of holding two meetings is to give everyone who wishes to do so the opportunity to be involved. The Brailsford meeting is intended principally for chapels other than Ashbourne, but both meetings will be open to all who find the time and place convenient.

Each meeting will start with an introduction which will outline the background to the Conference report: "God in Love Unites Us".

The five sections of the report will then be considered:

- Section 1 God has made us to be in relationships and to be sexual
- Section 2 God guides us in all our relating
- Section 3 God's guidance for marriage: developing our vision
- Section 4 Widening the practice of marriage
- Section 5 Next steps for the Methodist Church

For each section of the report, there will be a brief introduction outlining its content and the issues arising. These will then be discussed in small groups, with a number of questions to be considered. Each group will have a facilitator to guide the discussion and take a few notes.

Feedback

At the end of the meeting, each participant will be given a feedback sheet on which to record their reactions. It is not intended these should be filled in immediately, rather that they should be taken away and considered prayerfully, and then returned later. These views will then be fed into the District Synod when it meets on Saturday 25th April.

The issues are complicated and it is likely that views will differ within our chapels, as in the wider Church. Following the Conference debate, the President, Revd Dr Barbara Glasson, said this: "The debate was full of grace and prayerful thought. There were many personal, often painful, stories shared and representatives listened with great care and attention. My prayer is that this spirit of generosity and love shown today will be reflected as the proposals are discussed across the Church."

Before the meetings take place, those who wish to take part might find it helpful to look at the materials which are available:

- the report itself runs to 66 pages, but repays careful reading
- there is also a study guide, which is intended to be read alongside the full report – it is not a summary of the report

Some copies of these documents are being obtained and will be made available to chapels - preferably to be passed around. Alternatively, they may be read on-line or downloaded from the Methodist Church website. This will increase our understanding of the issues and inform our discussion.

The easiest way to access these and other related documents on-line is to google "Methodist Church Marriage and Relationships".

The Link Development – Update November 2019



Progress of Building Plans

- Following receipt of Listed Building Consent in March (which we reported last time) we submitted a Planning Application to Derbyshire Dales District Council on 23rd May. This application was for both the work we wish to do to develop our Church premises and for a housing development on the land at the back of the church (as reported before we have been advised to submit one application for all aspects of the development).
- Unfortunately, this application received some objections, the most significant of which was from the Environment Agency who wanted to reduce the area of the land which we could use for development, in particular to avoid land near their flood defence earthwork next to the Henmore Brook. Considering this objection, we were advised that our application would be rejected, which would not be helpful, so in August we withdrew our application before it went to the Planning Committee.
- There were also concerns from the planners about some aspects of the layout and design of the housing.
- Considering these objections and the increased availability of housing for older people in Ashbourne (e.g. Eliot Lodge and elsewhere) we have reviewed housing options, including taking input from local developers and have now submitted a further Pre-Application to DDDC planners with alternative options.
- There are also some detailing queries raised about the church development plans and further technical reports are requested. We are progressing these and believe they can be addressed satisfactorily.
- We expect to get the advice from our further "Pre-App" by the end of November, after which we will make a new Planning Application.
- The slow progress of the planning process is frustrating for all of us, but we are continuing to work hard with our architects AJA and will keep going until we get planning permission.

Other Matters

- In June we went to Methodist Church House in London ("Head Office") to explain our plans, how they support our Mission Action Plan "Plan for Growth" and understand directly from the Connexional Grants Team what we need to do to obtain a Connexional Grant. They were also very supportive on how to obtain grants more generally and also on how to think of our buildings as a strategic asset.
- We met Ashbourne Town Council Planning Committee in June to present our plans, which were well appreciated, and we received some very supportive comments.
- Ashbourne News Telegraph reporter Gareth Butterfield visited us in August and published a nice piece about our plans.

Fundraising

• The Fundraising Team continue to organise some excellent and enjoyable fundraising activities. The Pop-Up Shop was an amazingly innovative way to get some unwanted items re-cycled and raised a good amount of money. There was an excellent dinner in October with speaker Lydia Slack.

PHAKAMISA NEWSLETTER JUNE-SEPTEMBER 2019

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ Amen. As we are nearing the end of the year, we cannot help but stand in awe of God's faithfulness in every season. The faith that our staff embodied, and the love of God that continuously surrounds us, has brought us this far. We thank God for His mercies that endure forever.

Devotions

As Phakamisa, we build everything on the solid foundation of Jesus Christ and we continue to start our day, every day, with the usual morning devotions. Our care givers continue to pray together and share their testimonies as well. Devotions to them are still one of the important aspects in their lives. You find that when they are sharing or commenting, they say "I ran all the way as I didn't want to miss the devotions. I'm always looking forward to hear the word of God and praying."

During our devotions, we sometimes get some good feedback about the organisation from the care givers. The other day gogo (grandmother) Ncwaba from Lindelani area shared the following:

"I just want to thank Phakamisa for the skills that they teach us. Last week I was approached by our counsellor with some of our community leaders. They told me that they have heard through the grapevine that I make nice beadwork, and they asked if I can teach other community members to do it, and they will pay me. Surprised as I was, we talked and negotiated. "They then asked me if I had any certificates and, with a big smile, I showed them my Phakamisa beadwork certificate and they were very pleased. I also referred them to come visit Phakamisa to see the beautiful work that is done here. I am very happy, and my children and grandchildren are very excited about this. I love Phakamisa - nothing can separate me from it."

Early Childhood Development

We are grateful that we were able to enrol students in our Child Minder course and Edu Care and Supervisor course to uplift them. Seventy-five crèche teachers graduated from the Child Minder course in June (that is our six months' course), and twenty crèche supervisors also received their certificates in the supervisor course. It is always fulfilling when we receive a positive feedback about our training courses. One of the teachers in the Child Minder graduation said, when receiving her certificate:

"I have been waiting for this certificate for a long time. I approached one crèche for a job, and I told them that I was studying at Phakamisa finishing in June. They said that, once I get the certificate, I must come see them. My life is going to change, I promise you." At Phakamisa we really believe in making a difference in changing lives.

Wandering Schools (Orphans and Vulnerable Children)

Thank you to the Thompson Travellers Group who donated some breakfast meals for our children. As from July, the orphans in our wandering schools have started to eat warm cooked porridge every morning. The smiles that we see in those little faces when enjoying their meals are so adorable. One of the care givers asked one of our teachers what they put in the porridge at school, as her grandchild doesn't want to eat the porridge any more at home! We would like to also thank the volunteers in the community who assisted the Wandering School teachers with cooking.

Gender Based Violence Awareness Raising Blow a whistle campaign

In light of the recent events surrounding gender-based violence - the xenophobic attacks, the femicide in South Africa, and specifically, after the case of Ayakha Jiyane and her three siblings who were brutally murdered by their father - our organisation saw it fitting, and most necessary, to drive a campaign that would stand together alongside other initiatives in the country and raise awareness on this social epidemic.

We had a march with our male care givers and male friends who joined us during the day. Our objective with this campaign was to raise awareness of gender-based violence in and around the Pinetown community, and also to show that we are part of the struggle and to plead with people to stop abuse.

The campaign was successful, and we were grateful to receive the support of the Pinetown Methodist Church: Superintendent Rev. Sangweni, who joined us during the day and led the march.

We were also happy to receive positive response from the people and cars that were passing by. When distributing the pamphlets on genderbased violence, one of the males said to me "Mama (mother) I would like to apologise on behalf of the men, not all of us are abusers. Some of us are saying NOT IN OUR NAME." That small discussion meant a lot to us as women at the march.

When we came back, we lit the big candle and our small candles to respect and to pay tribute to all the victims of abuse. Rev. Sangweni led us in this session of candle lighting. He pleaded that the candles be lit first by any members of our volunteering staff who may have been victims of gender-based violence. This was a very touching and emotional moment for the women, many were in tears.

However this session ended on a very powerful and uplifting prayer. De-briefing and counselling sessions were then held with all of the victims, and we had a good closure with regards to this event.

In closing, I would like to thank each and every one who has played a part, in any capacity that has enabled us to make a difference into our disadvantaged communities. God bless you all.

We moved to Ashbourne in 2007, after 50 years in our house in Littleover. This was a very big decision for us, but after a lot of prayers, and persuasion from our daughter and son, we made the move. We are very happy here and thank God every day for our new church family and being made so welcome.

Now we celebrate 65 years of marriage, I realise that our God is still with us and we count our blessings every day.

Health activities in Ashbourne

Janet, from Derbyshire Dales District Council, came to one of our church lunches a few months ago to talk about a new health walk which had been launched. Since then the council has launched some more health activities suitable for older people in Ashbourne:

A Very Easy Walk: Every Tuesday 10.00am meeting outside the cricket pavilion at the top of the park. The very easy walks are suitable for those wanting to be more active, who may need the reassurance of walking with others, or are maybe recovering from injury or illness. It's free, simple and gentle on the body. The walk is led by qualified leaders and lasts about 30 minutes. We also enjoy a cup of tea afterwards in Betty's tea room.

Tone & Strengthen: Every Wednesday 9.30am-10.15am at the Empire Ballroom. This circuit style class is suitable for people of all ages and fitness levels, including those new to exercise. The class is designed to increase cardiovascular fitness while improving muscle tone & strength. The class also works on improving flexibility, posture and balance. All exercises are adapted to meet individual needs & goals.

Chair Based Exercise: Every Wednesday 11.45am-12.30pm at the Empire Ballroom. This class is suitable for those older adults who may suffer with mobility issues, health conditions, or have very little strength. It is low impact and focuses on improving cardiovascular fitness, muscular strength and endurance, which reduces the risk of falls and also improves flexibility and posture. All this helps in performing activities of daily living. The classes are very relaxed and social and are tailored to meet individual needs and goals.
