

Dear Friends.

"I'll be home for Christmas"

Where will you be and what are you doing this Christmas? It certainly looks as if things will be very different this year!

It's fair to say we're all a bit uncertain about what Christmas is going to look like this year. Perhaps

we're feeling a bit anxious, afraid, annoyed, or relieved! Yet the Christmas message of Emmanuel – the good news that God is with us – feels more appropriate than ever before in this extraordinary year.

The Methodist Church's Christmas campaign for 2020 is called #GodlsWithUs. It seeks to share this good news through stories of various individuals and their experiences of this extraordinary year.

Each day in Advent there will be a shared testimony from somebody connected to the Methodist Church, reflecting on what hope has looked like for them this year and how they have experienced God with them.

The stories include those who have felt the full effects of isolation, who have experienced extreme poverty, who have struggled with poor mental health, who have lost loved ones – like so many millions of others. But ultimately, incredibly, God's loving presence radiates from each of them in beams of powerful hope. Hope that is so necessary for such a time as this.



Echoed by the reported words of John Wesley on his death bed: 'the best of all is, God is with us' the Christmas campaign reminds us that even in the times which feel most uncertain, we can be certain of God. Who do you know who needs to hear this message over the coming months?

We are encouraged to consider our own story of faith in 2020 and to share it with others - to reflect, share stories, and reach out to others outside the church and encourage them to do the same.

We shall continue this in the new year as we begin to explore 'A Methodist Way of Life'. The calling of the Methodist Church is to "respond to the gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out its discipleship in worship and mission".

It's a way for Christians in the Methodist tradition to express their discipleship and spirituality by commitment to a set of practices based on "Our Calling". It puts into words how we can live our lives in response to God's love made known to us in Jesus. Like the early Christians, we seek to express what it means to follow Jesus in the regular, practical actions of worship, learning and caring, service and evangelism.

"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved". Acts 2:42-47

The commitments of 'A Methodist Way of Life' – which were distributed with the membership tickets this year – remind us of, and provide a compass for, Christian living. The Salvation Army and Ashbourne

Catherine Mumford

Ashbourne is the birthplace of Catherine Mumford who, in 1855, married William Booth, the founder of the Salvation Army. Catherine was born on 17th January 1829 at 13 Sturston Lane (now Sturston Road). This humble cottage is marked by a simple plaque above the door.

In 1834, the family moved to Boston, Lincolnshire, and then in 1844 to Brixton, London. By that time, Catherine was a committed Christian: she and her mother were devout and enthusiastic members of the Methodist Church.

She and William Booth first met in 1851 and became engaged in 1852. William was born in the same year as Catherine. At the time of their meeting, he was a Methodist local preacher but had been turned down as a candidate for the ministry. In 1855, he was ordained as a minister in the Methodist New Connexion and then married Catherine.



In 1860, Catherine also became a preacher and deputised for William when he was indisposed. William then felt called to evangelistic work, rather than circuit ministry. The following year, he broke free from the Methodist New Connection and set up an independent mission. Catherine was a full partner in this enterprise. In 1868, they acquired a mission hall in East London, and by 1874 the East London Mission had become a national institution. The title 'Salvation Army' was officially adopted in 1880. William took the rank of General and Catherine was regarded as the 'Mother of the Salvation Army'.

There is a bust of Catherine Booth in Ashbourne Park which was unveiled on Easter Sunday 1962. It was created by the Morris Art Bronze Foundry of London, based on work by the sculptor George Edward Wade (1853-1933).

The events of 1946

This notice was posted recently on a Salvation Army Facebook site. Paul Finnity, a member of the Derby Central Salvation Army who lives locally and is well known to Don Cox, thought it may be of interest to our church members.

In November 1946, Colonel Mary Booth, grand-daughter of William and Catherine Booth, visited Ashbourne, accompanied by her sister, Major Dora Booth.

Colonel Mary Booth was renowned for her welfare work amongst British troops in France 1914-18, for which she received the CBE. She was the leader of the Salvation Army's work in post-war Germany, then served in a number of other European countries. On the outbreak of World War II, she was in Belgium and consequently interned for three years in German camps, before being repatriated in 1943.

In the afternoon of Saturday 23rd November 1946 there was an open-air meeting in Sturston Lane, when Mary Booth unveiled the commemorative plaque which still remains on her grandmother's birthplace.

This was followed in the evening by a Salvation (evangelistic) Meeting in what was then known



as the Trinity Methodist Church. Colonel Booth was the principal speaker. This meeting was attended by Don, as a boy of 14. Following the closure of the Beulah Methodist Chapel in 1965, Trinity became simply the 'Ashbourne Methodist Church'.

A long-standing association

The event in 1946 was the beginning of a long association between the Ashbourne Methodist Church and the Derby Central Corps of the Salvation Army, which was founded in 1882.

In the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s, the Derby Salvation Army Band regularly gave concerts in the church. Paul was Band Secretary at the time and worked with Don in arranging these concerts. He says that Don was very supportive of the band.

The Derby Central Songsters also visited for concerts on a regular basis over the same period. The Songster Leader for most of the visits was lan Hammond, whose mother, Jean Gilliver at the time, sang a solo at the 1946 event. Ian is still playing in the band. Graham Smith, the son of the Deputy Bandmaster Smith who played a cornet solo at the event, is also still a member of Derby Central.

The Army Band last visited the church in 2015, although two years ago a concert was given in St John's Church. Don was in touch with the band more recently to try to arrange another concert in 2020. This has of course been thwarted by the coronavirus, but it is still hoped that another concert can be arranged before too long.

THE METHODIST COVENANT SERVICE

"Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Matthew 16:24

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." Matthew 22:37



John Wesley is generally held in high regard for his strenuous pioneer labours in founding and establishing what was first known as the Methodist Society, or Connexion.

Connexion (spelt with an 'x') is an important word because it connected the various societies and members across the country, and the world. It was a society. It connected the wealthy and the poor, those in plenty and those in need. These societies were all founded on the personal experience of men and women who had encountered Christ's saving love and understood a corresponding call for a full individual response.

Although an Anglican priest, when Wesley encountered practices in other Christian churches that he found helpful, he was happy to adopt them.

He had exposure to the life and witness of the Moravian church (our nearest Moravian settlement is at Ockbrook), and so two practices, the Watchnight and the Lovefeast service, in particular, became part of Methodist life and worship, and have come to us today.

From 1755, Wesley incorporated the Covenant service, taken from the Puritan tradition. So it can be seen that Wesley, where he saw merit, was eclectic in moulding a Methodist spirituality. This is our spirituality.

The Watchnight was thankfulness for the past year, the Lovefeast a corporate expression of present spiritual experience, and the Covenant a renewal of our personal promise together to God.

The Covenant service is now normally held only once per year, usually in January, or sometimes at the start of the Connexional year in September. It is a response to God's abounding love and grace and, as the Methodist Worship Book states: "the Covenant is not just a one to one transaction between individuals, but the act of the whole faith community". This includes me and you.

The challenge of Covenant is that it is a covenant - not a contract. Contracts have conditions, a Covenant is a total giving, there are no conditions - He is ours and we are His. It is all we are, hope for, and are yet to be. The service states: "We are content that he appoint us our place and work, and that he himself be our reward," and our response is:

"I am no longer my own but yours. Put me to what you will, rank me with whom you will... let me be employed for you or laid aside for you."

It is sometimes said that, in the Christian life, the enrolment fee is nothing, but the annual subscription is everything - demanding words for us all to be reminded of. It might be considered that to become a Christian requires nothing but our consent to follow, but the years that ensue demonstrate that the annual subscription is indeed all we have and are. The Covenant service affirms this.

The service has traditionally included a Charles Wesley hymn (Singing the Faith 549). The second verse reads:

"Give up ourselves, through Jesu's power, his name to glorify, and promise in this sacred hour, for God to live and die."

So we promise ourselves to God. In the words of Matthew's Gospel at the top of this article, it is about denying ourselves and following. Whether we be employed by God, or laid aside, exalted or brought low, whether we be full or empty, we are His and He is ours. So be it - no conditions! It is Covenant.

NEWS UPDATE FROM THE PHAKAMISA UK TRUST

The UK Trust held a meeting last week via Zoom and we were able to invite Zethu, the Phakamisa administrator, to join in and tell us about the current situation in Pinetown.

If we had been a little subdued, the mood of the meeting was suddenly lifted by the enthusiasm and energy of Zethu as she spoke of the arrangements they had in place to keep all safe and yet be able to restart the work.

The students have been allocated certain days when they can collect work and then return it, having studied at home. It is important that they are able to do this, as they should be graduating at the end of the year.

She then told us of the remarkable day when the Gogos (grannies) tried to storm the building. They needed to see that Thokozani was not in her office, clinging to the hope that somebody had got the story wrong. Eventually they were encouraged to go home, and stay there, as it was not safe for them to be travelling in overcrowded minibuses into Pinetown. The Monitors are trying to visit the care giver groups to support them in their vital work with the young.

The Wandering Schools are not yet open, but the teachers have collected materials and used them with a few of the children to make the Christmas Cards for us. Watch out for yours later on in December!

Covid 19 has left its mark on Phakamisa, and round the world, but it has strengthened the will and determination of the staff to continue, whatever the difficulties, with the work.

We thank you for your continued support. In due course we will let you know when Thokozani's successor is appointed. Meanwhile, please continue to pray for all involved in Phakamisa, both here and in South Africa.







Airline ticket office, Copenhagen: WE TAKE YOUR BAGS AND SEND THEM IN ALL DIRECTIONS.




